

#### c. Geopolitical analysis

Mali has a population of 20 million composed of several ethnic groups. Although French is the official language, most people speak national languages. A landlocked country, Mali is one of the 48 least developed countries (LDCs) in terms of its socio-economic development and has an economy that is still predominantly rural. The security situation in Mali remains a matter of concern, particularly in the country's central and northern regions, where violence is on the rise.

The Algiers Agreement signed in June 2015 aimed to restore peace and security to North Mali. The agreement provides for the disarmament of armed groups and greater powers for the regions. Since the beginning of 2018, however, central Mali has been affected by armed conflict between radical groups. Since 2020, the peace agreement has been challenged by a section of the population in Mali. Strong opposition to its application regularly causes tension between its various parties.

Following the COVID-19 epidemic, combined with a coup d'état in August 2020, the country went from strong economic growth of 5.1% of real GDP in 2019 to a recession in 2020, when real GDP dropped 2%. Mali's economy is insufficiently diversified and also highly dependent on the primary sector, which employs 68% of the working population. The Malian diaspora also contributes to national GDP. Unemployment remains extremely high at around 21.5%. Mali is a member of many regional organisations including the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS), the African Union and the G5 Sahel.



# Summary of HI presence in the country

HI has worked in Mali since 1993 on development activities in the south and north of the country. It advances the rights of people with disabilities, strengthens civil society, and promotes access to education for children with disabilities, the inclusive employment of people with disabilities, and the detection and care-management of disabilities in children, among other activities.

HI currently implements humanitarian and development activities in the regions of Sikasso, Bamako, Mopti, Timbuktu and Gao.

In 2021, the programme's activities are based on the following principal areas:

- Health & Prevention: functional rehabilitation, mother and child health, disability and HIV advocacy
- Physical and Functional Rehabilitation: detection and early treatment and care of disability
- Social and Inclusion: inclusive education, socio-professional inclusion, distributions for the development of livelihood activities
- Protection & Risk Reduction: risk education on explosive devices, assistance to victims of armed conflict, and conflict transformation in northern and central Mali
- Cross-Project Protection: protection, including child protection, the management of genderbased violence, and the inclusion of the specific needs of disabled people and minorities is taken into account by the different projects implemented by HI in Mali
- Mental Health and Psychosocial Support: Stress reduction/occupational burnout for staff, liaison psychology, psychosocial support for the most vulnerable people including people with disabilities
