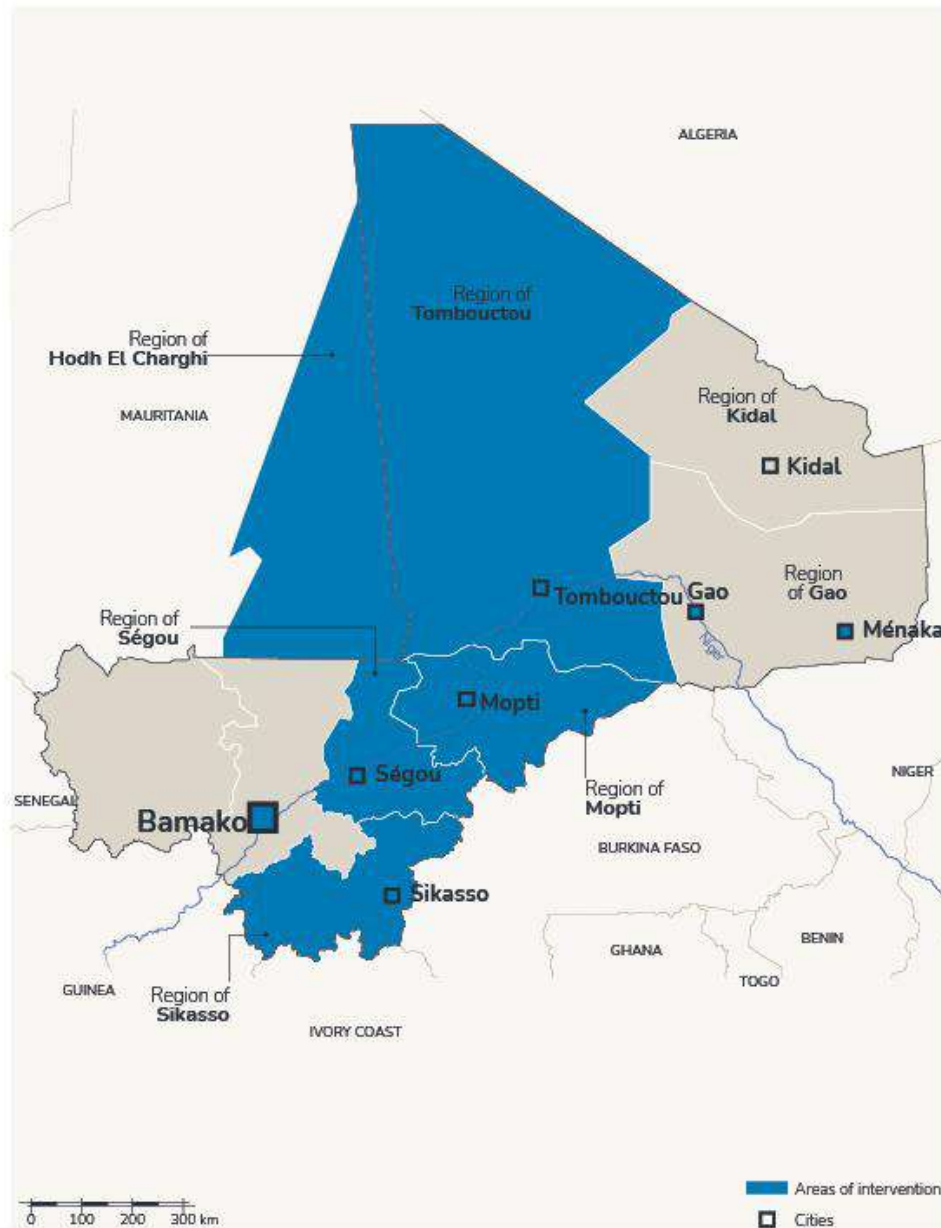

## c. Geopolitical analysis

### 1. Social, cultural and demographic context

Mali has a population of 20 million, composed of several ethnic groups. Although French is the official language, most people speak a national language. Mali is a landlocked country and one of the 48 least developed countries (LDCs) in terms of its socio-economic development, with an economy that is still predominantly rural. The security situation in Mali is concerning, particularly in the country's central and northern regions, where violence is on the rise.

### 2. Political situation

The Algiers Agreement signed in June 2015 was intended to restore peace and security to North Mali. The agreement provides for the disarmament of armed groups and greater powers for the regions. Since the beginning of 2018, however, central Mali has been the theatre of armed conflict between radical groups. Since 2020, the peace agreement has been challenged by a part of Malian public opinion. Strong opposition to its application regularly causes tension between the various parties.

### 3. Socio-economic context

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, a coup d'état in August 2020 and the economic and banking sanctions imposed by the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) during the first half of 2022, the country went from strong economic growth of 5.1% of real GDP in 2019 to a recession in 2020, when real GDP declined by 2%. Mali's economy is overly dependent on the primary sector, which employs 68% of the working population. The Malian diaspora also contributes to national GDP. Unemployment remains extremely high at around 21.5%. Mali is a member of many regional organisations including ECOWAS, the African Union and the Sahel. G5



# Summary of HI's work in the country

HI has worked on development activities in the south and north of Mali since 1993. These activities include the promotion of disability rights, civil society strengthening, the promotion of access to education for children with disabilities, disability inclusive employment and the detection and case-management of disabilities in children.

HI is currently implementing humanitarian and development activities in the regions of Sikasso, Bamako, Mopti, Timbuktu and Gao.

In 2022, the programme ran activities in the following sectors:

- Health & Prevention: functional rehabilitation, mother and child health and disability & HIV advocacy:
- Physical and functional rehabilitation: early detection, treatment and care of disabilities,
- Social and inclusion: inclusive education, socio-professional inclusion, distributions for the development of livelihood activities
- Protection & Risk reduction: risk education on explosive devices, assistance to victims of armed conflict and conflict transformation in northern and central Mali. Protection is incorporated into all the projects implemented by HI in Mali, including child protection, gender-based violence management, and the inclusion of the specific needs of people with disabilities and minorities
- Mental health and psychosocial support: reduction of stress/occupational burnout for staff, liaison psychology for people with disabilities and vulnerable populations.
